Can you find space for a Tiny Urban Forest?

City of Trees are a charity based in Greater Manchester helping to green school grounds by supplying free trees and delivering planting days with pupils. City of Trees complete an initial site assessment with all necessarily regulatory checks and map a proposed planting design bespoke to the needs of each school. On the planting day school pupils partake in a curriculum linked introduction to trees, followed by a demonstration on how to plant a tree. During the remainder of the session, children plant the trees themselves, becoming actively involved in greening their school grounds.

All trees, tools suitable for children, maintenance, and expertise are provided at no cost to the school! This scheme is open to all schools within Greater Manchester, with planting taking place between October 2024 and March 2025.

Green Week at Wigan & Leigh College

St Philip's Primary Goes Green!

Pupils at St Philip's Primary, Atherton, have been working hard to 'green-up' their school with an impressive green living wall in a once-barren part of their school playground.

Helped by a few grandparents who installed it, the wall is now finished and the Y5 Gardening Club alongside various classes have planted it up with plants kindly donated by Kevin and Michelle at Moss Bank Nursery, Leigh. All the plants are perennial and will be swapped over for summer then returned for winter planting. There is also a whole section dedicated to growing food!



The children have also been very busy planting 120 small variety trees to form two hedgerows. One in the orchard to increase the natural habitat available which will help increase biodiversity. The other hedgerow is at the end of the school field and is to help clean the air, encourage more biodiversity and to put an underground mycelium network in to support the three oak tree saplings waiting to be planted to create a shady oasis for the children to enjoy.
